

# From the Pastor's Desk...

The parable of the rich man is very easy to understand. Most people of faith immediately recognize grave sins and evils in the world, whether they be murder, killings, theft, adultery, or abuse of any kind against another person. There are, of course, many others. Today's Gospel from Luke speaks about greed and the proper place of material things in our lives. Jesus' warning to the crowd is clear:

# *"Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions."*

The abundant harvest of the rich man is indeed a blessing from God. After all, his harvest is a sign of hard work, good management, and even favorable weather. The building of larger storage barns would also seem reasonable. It would indeed be a shame to allow a great harvest to be wasted in the field or be spoiled for future use. A good harvest can feed a lot of hungry people. That is exactly what we want for American farmers and farmers in poorer countries.

Abundant blessings and accumulated wealth are not, however, "what matters to God," as Jesus said in the Gospel. God is concerned about our relationship to Him, to others we meet along the way in life, and how we understand ourselves. The prosperous rich man has confused his prosperity and abundance with his understanding of "the good life." That is why the rich man tells himself, "you have so many things stored up for many years: rest, eat, drink and be merry."

The rich man has lost himself and his very soul. Yes, earthly earnings and treasure may be used to satisfy one's own needs and the needs of one's family, and to alleviate the want and poverty of others. But the rich man has decided to build his life around all the "things" he now owns in great abundance. What he has accomplished and what he owns have become his "north star." We may think this can only happen to the extremely wealthy, the so called "rich and famous." But Jesus' warning applies to all of us.

God's measure of us is simple: our inner selves, and outer selves, warts and all. We are not known to God by our success, our abundance, or our "things." We are called, in turn, to know God – the source of grace and goodness, mercy and forgiveness, healing and peace


generosity and support of all of our works is greatly appreciated. If you would like to donate items for our food pantry, we have some specific needs at this time:

#### **Shared Parish Information**

Do members of the Pro-life Movement in the United States understand the enormous challenge which now confronts them in the wake of the Dobbs decision, which last month overturned the *Roe v. Wade* decision of 1973? Particularly, do Catholics grasp the great need which now must be met?

I refer specifically to a great number of women who will need tremendous financial, medical, and moral support if they are prohibited from undergoing an abortion. For decades, the Prolife Movement has prayed, voted, and lobbied for an end to abortion in almost every case. Now that this legal goal has been achieved, are these groups really prepared to assist these women – who often are poor, single, stand-alone women – in their great moment of crisis and need?

I mention this immediate challenge because many states are fully unprepared to step in to meet these needs. These expectant mothers will require pre-natal care, adequate medical insurance, and child care (if they are to return to work). Respect for life means that post-partum (after birth), there will be a great number of women whose own personal health and that of their newborns will require social services consistent with human dignity and medical necessity.

I have long believed that in our country, health care and protection of the most vulnerable (children with special needs, children without responsible [or both] parents, those in poverty, as well as disabled adults with special life challenges) are part of a consistent, across the board "Respect Life" ethic. Many of these become marginalized, forgotten and unfulfilled in their human and social potential.

Citizens of good will, faith, and compassion will now be called upon to create communities of our dreams – in which all life, the unborn and the born – is respected, nurtured, and supported. I think it proper to reflect on how much needs to be done – and how religious beliefs of mercy and compassion now compel us to take the next steps.
