### From the Pastor's Desk...

The Gospel of the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time is taken again from the "so-called" Sermon on the Mount. Jesus is teaching the disciples as once Moses taught the Jewish people when he descended Mt. Sinai and explained the Law (what became the Jewish Torah) to the former slaves from Egypt.

When we all were children, most of us had very clear cut, black and white rules from our parents. Rules and laws are easier for children to understand when they are simple, direct, and allow for no exceptions. To be sure, kids always try to bend the rules, find a way around them, or interpret them to their advantage. This is the world of kids. All of us remember those times, and have – hopefully – outgrown them.

One's attitude toward "law" depends not only on the reasons one sees for it, but also how one feels toward the law-giver. For example, most kids obey rules for one reason: to avoid punishment. All of us at times feared our parents and, obeying rules was seen as self-preservation: we were trying to stay out of trouble. It was the same way in school. We obeyed a teacher's rules to avoid staying after school or our parents finding out. Back then, we got double the punishment, once our parents found out.

Then, along the way, something unusual happened. We would follow our parents' rules because we discovered we liked them, (our parents - imagine that!) and sought their approval. A relationship of respect and love began to grow. If we decided we liked a teacher or liked the class or subject matter, we would do anything to get and stay on a teacher's good side. Obeying mom's and dad's rules – even those of the teacher – gave us a feeling of acceptance and security, and eventually their respect for us began to matter to us.

Granted, some parents then and today fail to demonstrate acceptance, love and approval. It also happened (from my days in education), that when students decided they did not like a teacher for whatever reason, they intentionally taunted that teacher and the rules were simply tossed out the window. Too often, as a principal/vice-principal, I had to sit in the back of the classroom playing the enforcer, so learning could take place – and to save the teacher.

Listen carefully to the Gospel today. Jesus is trying to move His disciples to a higher place. They should obey laws out of respect and love for God and neighbor, because they understand the laws better as mature, thinking people. Obeying laws and commandments because we fear God is the direct opposite of loving God – and neighbor. If we truly love other people, we do them no harm. Respecting rules and laws of any kind because we love God, we love people, and we wish them well – these are far better, higher motivations for ourselves and others to follow.



Ash Wednesday is a day of abstinence from meat and fasting for those between the ages of 18-59. The offertory collection on that day is a voluntary offering to support the J.O.I.N. Office, the outreach center of the Church for the needy, in downtown Columbus.

Ash Wednesday Collection: Proceeds of the Ash Wednesday collection will be contributed to the Joint Organization for Inner-city Needs (JOIN). #### Lenten Study Series: Seven Deadly Sins, **Seven Lively Virtues**
