

From the Pastor's Desk...

In last Sunday's Gospel, Peter was asked who he thought Jesus was. In other words, Peter was asked to identify Jesus – His person, His role, and His mission. Although he told Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," it turns out that Peter's personal confession left out an important part of the identity of Jesus.

Peter had yet to learn that this Jesus was the Suffering Servant, not the triumphant, conquering Messiah who would throw off Roman oppression. In today's Gospel, Peter strongly objects to Jesus' prediction of His passion and death. He did not wish to see the life of his teacher and good friend end in failure and death. Jesus told Peter, as He tells us today: "Whoever would come after me must deny himself and take up his cross... and follow me."

Peter and the other disciples had to learn the true meaning of Jesus' life and ministry. They are only beginning to understand the full meaning of discipleship. It is demanding and uncompromising. The true identity of Jesus would require that He give His life completely and appear, in the eyes of many, to be a foolish failure. The disciples have been exposed to the true, full identity of Jesus. His life and that of His followers, would require sacrifice and suffering.

Jesus posed His disciples two overwhelming questions. What profit is there in gaining the whole world but losing one's life? What can one possibly give in exchange for his life? These questions demand answers from us as well, because disciples of Christ – ourselves included – may be unprepared to offer an immediate answer. We need to place the cross and all that it means at the center of our lives. Therein we discover the true meaning of being a follower of Christ.

SACRIFICIAL LOVE


Reflection on Matthew 16:21-27

Last week, Jesus affirmed Peter's answer and insight as correct. Today, Peter gets it wrong, and Jesus must rebuke him, and then instruct His disciples on what it means to be the Christ.

The suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus anchors everything about what it means to be a follower of Jesus, a missionary disciple, a Christian. How often do we want to jump to the glory of the Resurrection, to a triumphalism, without passing through the suffering and death. The self-denial that Jesus speaks of – taking up our cross and following in His footsteps – is a necessary path and mystery for us to walk. It is not an end in itself, but a pathway – a journey of sacrificial love – that leads to the new life of the resurrection.

The truth is that this Paschal Mystery is the life in Christ we live daily, dying and rising over and over again, so that every moment, every relationship, every event and opportunity that comes our way, is infused with self-sacrificing love, in order to glorify God.

SAINT GREGORY THE GREAT

Feast Day: September 3

Patron Saint of: Musicians and Teachers

Gregory was the prefect of Rome before he was 30. After five years in office he resigned, founded six monasteries on his Sicilian estate, and became a Benedictine monk in his own home at Rome.

Ordained a priest, Gregory became one of the pope's seven deacons, and also served six years in the East as papal representative in Constantinople. He was recalled to become abbot, but at the age of 50 was elected pope by the clergy and people of Rome.

Gregory was direct and firm. He removed unworthy priests from office, forbade taking money for many services, emptied the papal treasury to ransom prisoners of the Lombards and to care for persecuted Jews and the victims of plague and famine. He was very concerned about the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his own monastery. He is known for his reform of the liturgy, and for strengthening respect for doctrine. Whether he was largely responsible for the revision of "Gregorian" chant is disputed.

His book, *Pastoral Care*, on the duties and qualities of a bishop, was read for centuries after his death. He described bishops mainly as physicians whose main duties were preaching and the enforcement of discipline. In his own down-to-earth preaching, Gregory was skilled at applying the daily Gospel to the needs of his listeners. Called "the Great," Gregory has been given a place with Augustine, Ambrose, and Jerome, as one of the four key doctors of the Western Church.

An Anglican historian has written: "It is impossible to conceive what would have been the confusion, the lawlessness, the chaotic state of the Middle Ages without the medieval papacy; and of the medieval papacy, the real father is Gregory the Great."

Labor Day, Monday, September 5, 2023 Labor Day provides Catholics the opportunity to reflect on the meaning of this day: to honor the dignity and value of human labor, and of course, the workers who carry the American economy on their backs. Do you know what

the Catholic Church teaches about the rights and duties of all workers?

- The rights of workers, like all other rights, are based on the nature of the human person and on the dignity of each worker. The economy of any country should serve the worker (the human person), not the other way around!
- The Church teaches that workers have the right to a just and living wage, the right to a pension and to insurance for old age, sickness, and in work-related accidents.
- The Church believes workers have the right to organize (form a union) and to enter collective bargaining for their wages and working conditions, the right to strike and withhold their labor when they deem it necessary.
- The Church believes current economic systems can, in many ways, cause enormous suffering to workers, assaulting a worker's dignity and the value of our Common Home (this earth!) and sustain the invisible tyranny of money that only guarantees privileges of a few. (Pope Francis)
- As followers of Jesus, we should judge economic choices and institutions by how they protect or undermine the life and dignity of the human person, and serve the common good of all citizens and participants.

A worker owes the employer a good day's work for a fair and living wage. All parents need to teach their children the value of work in shaping not only their future, but also their talents and contributions to the common good of our society.



Produce Market: Our parishes will be hosting our Produce Market at Holy Spirit, **this Friday, September 8th**. Volunteers are again needed to help set up, distribute and clean up. Setup will begin about 1:30 p.m., with distribution from 3:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m. Come when you can and work as long as you are able.

St. Philip Food Pantry

In 1987, a group of **St. Philip** parishioners decided to open a food pantry to serve people in a few east Columbus zip codes. A few years later, under the direction of the **St. Vincent de Paul Society**, the pantry moved to the basement of the rectory. After St. Philip School closed, it was relocated to its current location. It is housed in several rooms on the lower level of the school building located behind St. Philip Catholic Church.

Our loyal and dependable volunteers ordered food by hand from the **Mid-Ohio Food Bank** and bagged up the food to give to our clients. Clients came into the building to check in and food was distributed based upon family size. Volunteers assisted the clients back to their cars and loaded their bags for them. Some years later, a clothing room was added for donated clothing and household items. Clients were invited to select items, at no charge, from the clothing room according to their family needs. With the addition of computers, ordering food was simplified and client information was able to be maintained online, replacing the manual card system.

During the **COVID pandemic**, changes were made for the safety of volunteers and clients. Clients remained in their cars while information was taken for check-in and groceries delivered directly to them. No clients entered the building. The clothing room was permanently closed.

In addition to the weekly food pantry duties, volunteers participated in other charitable activities. Once a month, pantry volunteers prepared sandwiches and delivered them to **St. Lawrence Haven** for their clients. During **Advent, two "giving" trees** were installed in the church complete with suggested gift tags. Parishioners fulfilled the tag request and placed the donated items under the tree. Our volunteers delivered the items to the residents of the nursing home they were working with that year as well as pantry clients. At certain times of the year, special donations of **school supplies, blankets, towels, and cleaning supplies** were also included with the groceries.

Along with the many parishioners of St. Philip, other churches and organizations such as St. Matthew in Gahanna, St. Timothy in Columbus and the Knights of Columbus supported our pantry. The generosity of all was always greatly appreciated.

On August 30, 2023, groceries were provided one last time. We said goodbye and Godspeed to all the clients we have served and the friends we have made. We thank all who have helped us along the way. We pray we have made the lives of our clients a little easier and that they are able to find needed assistance elsewhere.

Reverend Veevin Richard Pitchaisavary, SAC, was born in Irudayampattu, Tamil Nadu, India, in 1990. He is the youngest of five siblings in his family. He speaks Tamil

and English. He studied at his diocesan Catholic high school. As a boy, he used to serve at the altar for daily Masses. Being an altar server inspired him to take a step closer to God. Therefore, he decided to join the priesthood, and joined the Pallottines in 2006. He earned his BA in English literature at Loyola College, Chennai, Philosophy in Goa, and Sacred Theology in Mysore. He was ordained in 2018. After ordination, he was assigned as associate pastor at St. Antony Church, Kanyakumari in 2018. In 2019, he worked as associate pastor at St. Vincent Pallotti Church, Madurai. In 2020, he worked as associate pastor at St. Michael Church, Sivagangai. In 2021, he was bursar for the philosophical seminary at Trichy. In 2022, he was appointed as Pastor at St. Joseph Church, Pechiparai, Kanyakumari. As a priest, the thing that he loves the most is working in the parishes catering to the spiritual needs of the people. Fr. Richard, as he prefers to be called, is currently the Parochial Vicar of St. Philip and Holy Spirit Parishes, and on December 1st, will officially become the pastor of Holy Spirit Parish.

The New Bishop Griffin Resource Center was recently dedicated on the grounds of Christ the King Parish. Bishop Earl Fernandes, as well as our retired Bishop James A. Griffin, were present for the event. The new building was a dream of the St. Vincent de Paul Society there for the past 15 years, and was completed at a cost of \$4.2 million.
